**Terrorism, Insurgency and Indian-English Literature, 1830-1947** Alex Tickell.2013-06-17 This book is an interdisciplinary study of representations of terrorism and political violence in the fiction and journalism of colonial India. Focusing on key historical episodes such as the Calcutta Black Hole, the anti-thuggee campaigns of the 1830s, the 1857 rebellion, and anti-colonial terrorism in Edwardian London, it argues that exceptional violence was integral to colonial sovereignty and that the threat of violence mutually defined discursive relations between colonizer and colonized. These are examined alongside works by better-known Anglo-Indian authors such as Philip Meadows Taylor's *Confessions of a Thug* (1838), Flora Annie Steel's *On the Face of the Waters* (1897), Rudyard Kiplings short fictions and novels by Edmund Candler and E.M. Forster. The study concludes with an analysis of Indian-English fiction of the 1930s, notably Mulk Raj Anands *Untouchable* (1935), and goes on to read Gandhis philosophy of ahimsa (non-violence) as a strategic response to a colonial and nationalist terror-politics.
