In reality, however, networks are marked, at core, by disconnection. With lively historical sources and an accessible engagement with critical theory, *When the Medium was the Mission* tells the story of how connection was made into the fundamental promise of networks, illuminating the power of public Protestantism in the first network imaginaries, which continue to resonate today in false expectations of connection.
