For the child, there are often arduous and painful treatment regimes, frequent school absences, low energy periods, and uncertainties with respect to future education and vocation. The course of many diseases is unpredictable, and the very fact of chronicity implies ongoing coping problems for the family and the child. The impact of a chronic illness or handicapping condition on a family system is usually more disintegrative than integrative, disrupting the lives of all family members and exacerbating the developmental risks to the child. It is not surprising that a recent comprehensive study for establishing public policies for children with chronic illness at Vanderbilt University has called attention to these factors and produced, as a primary recommendation, increased attention to the psychological impact of disease on the family and the child. In this context there is an important need for adequate assessment of psychological and behavioral problems in these children to plan for

appropriate services.
