**In the Palace of Nezahualcoyotl** Eduardo de J. Douglas.2010-04-15 Around 1542, descendants of the Aztec rulers of Mexico created accounts of the pre-Hispanic history of the city of Tetzco, Mexico, one of the imperial capitals of the Aztec Empire. Painted in iconic script (picture writing), the *Codex Xolotl*, the *Quinatzin Map*, and the *Tlohtzin Map* appear to retain and emphasize both pre-Hispanic content and also pre-Hispanic form, despite being produced almost a generation after the Aztecs surrendered to Hernán Cortés in 1521. Yet, as this pioneering study makes plain, the reality is far more complex. Eduardo de J. Douglas offers a detailed critical analysis and historical contextualization of the manuscripts to argue that colonial economic, political, and social concerns affected both the content of the three Tetzcoan pictorial histories and their archaizing pictorial form. As documents composed by indigenous people to assert their standing as legitimate heirs of the Aztec rulers as well as loyal subjects of the Spanish Crown and good Catholics, the Tetzcoan manuscripts qualify as subtle yet shrewd negotiations between indigenous and Spanish systems of signification and between indigenous and Spanish concepts of real property and political rights. By reading the Tetzcoan manuscripts as calculated responses to the changes and challenges posed by Spanish colonization and Christian evangelization, Douglas's study significantly contributes to and expands upon the scholarship on central Mexican manuscript painting and recent critical investigations of art and political ideology in colonial Latin America.

**I'll Take You There** Amie Thurber, Learotha Williams.2021-05-15 Before there were guidebooks, there were just guides—people in the community you could count on to show you around. *I'll Take You There* is written by and with the people who most intimately know Nashville, foregrounding the struggles and achievements of people's movements toward social justice. **Pro-Life, Pro-Choice** Bertha Manninen.2014-07-01 In this provocative and accessible book, the author defends a pro-choice perspective but also takes seriously pro-life concerns about the moral value of the human fetus, questioning whether a fetus is nothing more than mere tissue. She examines the legal status of the fetus in the recent Personhood Amendments in state legislatures and in Supreme Court decisions and asks whether *Roe v. Wade* should have focused on the viability of the fetus or on the bodily integrity of the woman. Manninen approaches the abortion controversy through a variety of perspectives and ethical frameworks. She addresses the social circumstances that influence many women's decision to abort and considers whether we believe that there are good and bad reasons to abort. Manninen also looks at the call for post-abortion fetal grieving rituals for women who desire them and the attempt to make room in the pro-choice position for the views of prospective fathers. The author spells out how the two sides demonize each other and proposes ways to find degrees of convergence between the seemingly intractable positions.

*Mexico at the World's Fairs* Mauricio Tenorio-Trillo.2018-06-01 This intriguing study of Mexico's participation in world's fairs from 1889 to 1929 explores Mexico's self-presentation at these fairs as a reflection of the country's drive toward nationalization and a modernized image. Mauricio Tenorio-Trillo contrasts Mexico's presence at the 1889 Paris fair—where its display was the largest and most expensive Mexico has ever mounted—with Mexico's presence after the 1910 Mexican Revolution at fairs in Rio de Janeiro in 1922 and Seville in 1929. *Anonimo Mexicano* Richley Crapo, Bonnie Glass-Coffin. 2005-09-30 *Anonimo Mexicano* is the first publication of the full Nahuatl text and English translation of a rare and important Native history of pre-conquest Mexico. Written circa 1600 by an anonymous Tlaxcaltecan author, it is an epic account of the settling of central Mexico by Nahua peoples from the northern frontier. They developed a sophisticated culture with powerful city states and an agricultural economy, fought great wars, established dynasties, and recorded their history and legends in painted books. The Mexica became the most powerful of these nations until their conquest by the Spanish with the help of the Tlaxcalteca, who were rivals of the Mexica and whose national origin tale was recorded in *Anonimo Mexicano*.

*Colonial Cataclysms* Bradley Skopyk. 2020-04-14 The contiguous river basins that flowed in Tlaxcala and San Juan Teotihuacan formed part of the agricultural heart of central Mexico. As the colonial project rose to a crescendo in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries, the Indigenous farmers of central Mexico faced long-term problems standard historical treatments had attributed to drought and soil degradation set off by Old World agriculture. Instead, Bradley Skopyk argues that a global climate event called the Little Ice Age brought cold temperatures and elevated rainfall to the watersheds of Tlaxcala and Teotihuacan. *Historia de la nación Chichimeca* Fernando de Alva Ixtlilxochitl.2012-09-01 La Historia de la nación chichimeca se termino hacia 1640 por Fernando de Alva Cortés Ixtlilxóchitl. El título se debe a Carlos de Sigüenza y Góngora, quien fue propietario del Manuscrito. Lorenzo Boturini, otro propietario del original, lo llamó Historia general de la Nueva España. Hay evidencia de que la Historia de la nación chichimeca formó parte de un texto más amplio que se ha perdido, o acaso no fue terminado. En 1891 Alfredo Chavero publicó y comentó los libros de Ixtlilxóchitl con el título de Obras históricas. El relato se inicia con la creación del mundo, según la tradición indígena, y llega hasta la conquista castellana. Por desgracia, las versiones que se han conservado están incompletas. El relato de la conquista en esta obra termina repentinamente en el capítulo que narra las últimas batallas para la toma de Tenochtitlan. La obra, fiel reflejo del mestizaje cultural y racial del virreinato, está construida y pensada conforme a los moldes de la historiografía europea, pero los datos que expone se basan en las antiguas pinturas o códices pictográficos. Este interesante compendio responde a unos motivos muy concretos: un nuevo nacionalismo y la construcción de la identidad de México, entre los novohispanos del siglo XVI. No debe extrañar, pues, que no se encuentren en esta crónica indiana vencedores ni vencidos. Para Ixtlilxochitl, el chichimeca Xolotl, un salvaje similar al bárbaro europeo, Nezahualcoyotl, el refinado príncipe mexicano, o Juan Pérez de Peralda, padre del autor, eran mexicanos antes que españoles o indios nahuatl. El proyecto historiográfico de Fernando de Alva Ixtlilxóchitl tuvo como misión construir una imagen extraordinaria y precristiana del pueblo texcocano. Por ello inició su trayecto con los chichimecas y finalizó con la fraternidad hacia el conquistador. Fernando de Alva Ixtlilxóchitl (1578-1650) pertenece a un grupo de escritores de sangre indígena. Entre ellos están Fernando de Alvarado Tezozómoc, Domingo de San Antón Muñón Chimalpahin, Diego Muñoz y Camargo y Juan Bautista Pomar. En sus obras, estos autores trataron de construir la historia de sus respectivas regiones. Querían situarlas en un lugar preponderante, exaltando las virtudes de sus pueblos, con el objetivo de alcanzar beneficios dentro de sus contextos coloniales.

Weaving the Past Susan Kellogg.2005-09-02 *Weaving the Past* offers a comprehensive and interdisciplinary history of Latin America's indigenous women. While the book concentrates on native women in Mesoamerica and the Andes, it covers indigenous people in other parts of South and Central America, including lowland peoples in and beyond Brazil, and Afro-indigenous peoples, such as the Garifuna, of Central America. Drawing on primary and secondary sources, it argues that change, not continuity, has been the norm for indigenous peoples whose resilience in the face of complex and long-term patterns of cultural change is due in no small part to the roles, actions, and agency of women. The book provides broad coverage of gender roles in native Latin America over many centuries, drawing upon a range of evidence from archaeology, anthropology, religion, and politics. Primary and secondary sources include chronicles, codices, newspaper articles, and monographic work on specific regions. Arguing that Latin America's indigenous women were the critical force behind the more important events and processes of Latin America's history, Kellogg interweaves the region's history of family, sexual, and labor history with the origins of women's power in prehispanic, colonial, and modern South and Central America. Shying away from interpretations that treat women as house bound and passive, the book instead emphasizes women's long history of performing labor, being politically active, and contributing to, even supporting, family and community well-being.

In downtown Stockton, they created Little Manila, a vibrant community of hotels, pool halls, dance halls, restaurants, grocery stores, churches, union halls, and barbershops. Little Manila was home to the largest community of Filipinas/os outside of the Philippines until the neighborhood was decimated by urban redevelopment in the 1960s. Narrating a history spanning much of the twentieth century, Dawn Bohulano Mabalon traces the growth of Stockton's Filipina/o American community, the birth and eventual destruction of Little Manila, and recent efforts to remember and preserve it. Mabalon draws on oral histories, newspapers, photographs, personal archives, and her own family's history in Stockton. She reveals how Filipina/o immigrants created a community and ethnic culture shaped by their identities as colonial subjects of the United States, their racialization in Stockton as brown people, and their collective experiences in the fields and in the Little Manila neighborhood. In the process, Mabalon places Filipinas/os at the center of the development of California agriculture and the urban West.
