First Nations peoples, who were motivated by aspirations for autonomy and empowerment, went on to create the foundations of Indigenous social infrastructure. This book explains the ways First Nations people in cities created and took control of their own futures. A fact largely wilfully ignored in policy contexts. Today, differences exist over the way governments and First Nations peoples see the role and

responsibilities of Indigenous institutions in cities. Royal Commission on Aboriginal Peoples, René Dussault, Erasmus, Georges. 1996 This book is an introduction to some of the main themes and conclusions in the final, five-volume report of a royal commission that directed its consultations to examining the foundations of a fair and honourable relationship between the Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal peoples of Canada. The commission held public hearings, visited communities, commissioned research studies, and reviewed numerous past inquiries and reports before producing its final report. That report is an account of the relationship between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people as a central facet of Canada's heritage, of the distortion of that relationship over time, and of the terrible consequences of that distortion for Aboriginal people. It also makes recommendations on restoring a fair and honourable relationship. Chapters of the book correspond to the report's five volumes, and cover such topics as the history of Aboriginal/non-Aboriginal relations, Aboriginal self-government, social and economic conditions, Aboriginal cultural heritage, and the commitment to renewal.

Coyote U Secwepemc Education Institute. 1999 The Secwepemc People, known by non-natives as the Shuswap, are a Nation of 17 bands occupying the south-central part of the Province of British Columbia, Canada. The ancestors of the Secwepemc people have lived in the interior of British Columbia for at least 10,000 years. At the time of contact with Europeans in the late 18th century, the Secwepemc occupied a vast territory, extending from the Columbia River valley on the east slope of the Rocky Mountains to the Fraser River on the west and from the upper Fraser River in the north to the Arrow Lakes in the south. Traditional Shuswap territory covers approximately 145,000 square kilometres (56,000 square miles). The Nation was a political alliance that regulated use of the land and resources, and protected the territories of the Shuswap. Although the bands were separate and independent, they were united by a common language - Secwepemctsin - and a similar culture and belief system. The traditional Secwepemc were a semi-nomadic people, living during the winter in warm semi-underground pit-houses and during the summer in mat lodges made of reeds. The traditional Shuswap economy was based on fishing, hunting and trading. Shuswap diet consisted of fish, meat, berries and roots. The lifestyle, based on respect for nature, depended on traditional aboriginal skills and knowledge handed down from generation to generation by oral tradition. However, in the 19th century the Secwepemc culture was transformed with the appearance of fur traders, missionaries, gold miners, and settlers --://www.secwepemc.org/about/ourstory.

Perspectives on Engaging the Participation of First Nations Peoples in the Development of Child Welfare Under Self-government Marlyn Bennett. 2003 Community consultation with the First Nations communities was envisioned in the 1994 Manitoba Framework Agreement Initiative and reflects an understanding of the importance of including First Nations communities and citizens in decision-making processes under self-government. Consultation is an important aspect to establishing self-governments for First Nations peoples and communities not only in Manitoba but also across Canada. The consultation process as envisaged by the authors of the Manitoba Framework Agreement Initiative sought to honour the spirit of First Nation traditions by including First Nations citizens in a consensus building process that would build upon the values, customs and principles of First Nations cultures whose participation in turn would form the foundations of independent governing structures with supporting legislation. How consultations have been conducted in relation to child welfare initiatives needs also to be examined, documented, perceptions shared and supported as a modern day process that reflects how decision-making is being conducted by the First Nations within Manitoba on their path toward self-determination. This research is one attempt to understand the consultation process. It focuses on some of the experiences and challenges on how First Nations citizens have been engaged in public discussions that will inform the development of contemporary First Nations governing institutions. This research combines an overview of the literature focusing specifically on self-government in relation to child welfare and First Nations people. The literature review also looks at the role First Nations peoples have played in community consultations concentrating specifically on the ways First Nations peoples and communities have been engaged to participate in other consultation initiatives carried out by Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal governments and/or non-government organizations. The review of the literature is supplemented by an examination of two very specific child welfare initiatives currently underway in the Province of Manitoba, with more attention paid primarily to the Manitoba Framework Agreement Initiative. The examination of these two initiatives is then followed by an in-depth data analysis of interviews carried out with a select group of child welfare professionals from within and outside Manitoba who shared their perspectives on aspects of engaging First Nations

people's participation in shaping the future of child welfare under self-government. This research will be of particular importance to First Nations communities, governments and child welfare authorities who are interested in engaging and empowering First Nations peoples' to participate in public discussions on the decision making process that might be instrumental for informing the vision, philosophy, structure and the consultation aspects of self-determining efforts of First Nations peoples.

Jetté.2002 In this study an attempt is made to show how the historical exclusion of Indigenous knowledge (IK) from the policy deliberation process in Canada has had a detrimental impact on Aboriginal peoples in Canada. A review of the history of Aboriginal peoples in Canada shows how IK came to be marginalized by colonial and Canadian governments, and analyzes how marginalization has contributed to poor social conditions in Aboriginal communities, as well as the deterioration of the governance relationship between Aboriginal peoples and the government of Canada. An argument is developed for the reincorporation of IK into the policy process through the negotiation and implementation of Aboriginal self-government, and evidence is presented showing how self-government would be a more desirable and effective approach to encouraging IK inclusion than reforms to existing consultative and representative institutions.

When Hillary is offered a teaching position on a remote, First Nation Reserve called Pleasant Valley, she is unprepared for the amazing adventures ahead. Teaching on the Reserve was only one aspect of the remarkable experience. Although she loved teaching many grade five students in a busy rotation schedule, some features of her new job were terrifying and did not bring out the best in people. Drawing upon her personal journal entries, Hillary recounts stressful situations caused by small aircraft not landing due to low ceiling heights, pilots announcing good news and bad news. Read from the comfort of your favorite chair, what it was like for her to discover an unannounced Native man in her living room feigning an eye injury so that he could use her bathroom and steal all her hairspray! *i Teach, Preach and Love* parachutes you onto a remote, First Nation Reserve that is more akin to a ghetto experience, complete with boil only water warnings, rather than the dream job hoped to obtain after graduating from Teacher's College. HISTORICAL BACKGROUND: In 1876, the Indian Act of Canada mandated Native Indians to live on parcels of land, called Reserves. Indian families were forced to surrender their young children and send them to schools far away from home. These were called Residential Schools. Many of the schools were underfunded and innocent children suffered and tragically died. In 1972, the control of education was transferred to the First Nations peoples of Canada, yet the funding remained the responsibility of provincial and federal governments of Canada. On June 11th, 2008, Prime Minister Harper publicly apologized to former students of Residential Schools and stated it was a "sad chapter in our history". He admitted there were "two primary objectives of the residential school systems. One was to remove and isolate the children from the influence of their homes, families and traditions and cultures. The second was to assimilate the children into a dominant culture". Residential school survivors who suffered serious psychological effects from attending the schools received payments up to \$250,000.00. It is estimated payments will cost the government a total of one billion to two billion dollars. Historical data is of significance because it lays the foundation for the current educational situation facing Native children on Reserves highlighted within the book, *i Teach, Preach and Love*. As an "import" teacher I witnessed other factors outside of the classroom that were unusual considering I was living within the great country of Canada. At university, my major was history. I studied in depth the sad history of the First Nations peoples and unexpectedly developed a compassionate heart towards the aboriginal peoples of Canada. *i Teach, Preach and Love* is of value because it illuminates aspects of life on a Reserve that major television networks with their cameras only attempt to capture on film. But, unless you live on a Reserve and see first-hand, it is impossible to understand the complexities, poverty and despair facing most of the Aboriginal peoples. ENJOY!

Cook, of course, was not engaged on an expedition of colonization, so when he encountered for the first time a war party of Maori, he certainly had no intention of challenging their overlordship of Aotearoa, although he certainly was interested in discovering more about them. Taking into account similarities of appearance, customs and languages spread across a vast region of scattered islands, it was obvious that the Polynesian race emerged from a single origin, and that origin Cook speculated was somewhere in the Malay Peninsula or the East Indies. In this regard, he was not too far from the truth. The origins of the Polynesian race have been fiercely debated since then, and it was only relatively recently, through genetic and linguistic research, that it can now be stated with certainty that the Polynesian race originated on the Chinese mainland and the islands of Taiwan, the Philippines, Malaysia and Indonesia. Oceania was, indeed, the last major region of the Earth to be penetrated and settled by people, and Polynesia was the last region of Oceania to be inhabited. The vehicle of this expansion was the outrigger canoe, and aided by tides and wind patterns, a migration along the Malay Archipelago, and across the wide expanses of the South Pacific, began sometime between 3000 and 1000 BCE, reaching the western Polynesian Islands in about 900 BCE. That said, the 19th century certainly wasn't exciting for the people who already lived in Australia.
