**The Art of Looking** Lance Esplund. 2018-11-27 A veteran art critic helps us make sense of modern and contemporary art The landscape of contemporary art has changed dramatically during the last hundred years: from Malevich's 1915 painting of a single black square and Duchamp's 1917 signed porcelain urinal to Jackson Pollock's midcentury drip paintings; Chris Burden's *Shoot* (1971), in which the artist was voluntarily shot in the arm with a rifle; Urs Fischer's *You* (2007), a giant hole dug in the floor of a New York gallery; and the conceptual and performance art of today's Ai Weiwei and Marina Abramovic.
