Cinema I Gilles Deleuze. 2013-10-24 Gilles Deleuze was one of the most influential figures in twentieth-century philosophy, well known for his works on the philosophy of art and for his master-works, *Difference and Repetition* and - with Felix Guattari - *A Thousand Plateaus* and *Anti-Oedipus*. *Cinema I* is the first volume of Deleuze's revolutionary work on the theory of cinema (concluded in *Cinema II*, also available in the Bloomsbury Revelations series). To this end schizoanalytic pedagogy calls for a ‘new earth’ of transformed values and relationships.

Deleuze and Cinema Barbara Kennedy.2000-12-15 Film theory has for so long been concerned with sociological, empirical and psychoanalytic approaches that its place within our aesthetic sensibilities seems to have been forgotten. *Deleuze and Cinema* aims to bring back debates about film as an art form - as part of an aesthetic process which incorporates the 'bodies' of our material, technological and molecular worlds. Deleuze and the Gynesis of Horror demonstrates how the techniques of horror film – editing, sound and visual effects, lighting and colour, camera movement – work in tandem with a film's content to affect the viewer's body in ways that disrupt the sense of self as a whole, unified subject with a stable, monolithic identity and, in some cases, can serve to breakdown the binary between self/Other, as we come to realize that we are none of us static, categorizable beings but are, as Henri Bergson said, “living things constantly becoming.”
