Statisticians need random number generators to test and compare estimators before using them in real life. In operations research, random numbers are a key component in large scale simulations. Computer scientists need randomness in program testing, game playing and comparisons of algorithms. The applications are wide and varied. Yet all depend upon the same computer generated random numbers. Usually, the randomness demanded by an application has some built-in structure: typically, one needs more than just a sequence of independent random bits or independent uniform [0,1] random variables. Some users need random variables with unusual densities, or random combinatorial objects with specific properties, or random geometric objects, or random processes with well defined dependence structures. This is

precisely the subject area of the book, the study of non-uniform random variables. The plot evolves around the expected complexity of random variable generation algorithms.
