Italian Women Writers Katharine Mitchell.2014-05-27 Post-Unification Italy saw an unprecedented rise of the middle classes, an expansion in the production of print culture, and increased access to education and professions for women, particularly in urban areas. Although there was still widespread illiteracy, especially among women in both rural and urban areas, there emerged a generation of women writers whose domestic fiction and journalism addressed a growing female readership. This study looks at the work of three of the most significant women writers of the period: La Marchesa Colombi, Neera, and Matilde Serao. These writers, whose works had been largely forgotten for much of the last century, only to be rediscovered by the Italian feminist movement of the 1970s, were widely read and received considerable critical acclaim in their day. In their realist fiction and journalism, these professional women writers documented and brought to light the ways in which women participated in everyday life in the newly independent Italy, and how their experiences differed profoundly from those of men. Novels and the Sociology of the Contemporary Arpad Szokolczai.2016-04-14 This book substantiates two claims. First, the modern world was not simply produced by objective factors, rooted in geographical discoveries and scientific inventions, to be traced to economic, technological or political factors, but is the outcome of social, cultural and spiritual processes. Among such factors, beyond the Protestant ethic (Max Weber), the rise of the absolutist state and its disciplinary network (Michel Foucault), or court society (Norbert Elias), a prime role is played by theatre. The modern reality is deeply theatricalized. Second, a special access for studying this theatricalized world is offered by novels. The best classical novels not simply can be interpreted as describing a world like the theatre, but they capture and present a world that has become thoroughly transformed into a global theatre. The theatre effectively transformed the world, and classical novels effectively analyze this theatricalized reality - much better than the main instruments supposedly destined to study reality, philosophy and sociology. Thus, instead of using the technique of sociology to analyze novels, the book will treat novels as a royal road to analyze a theatricalized reality, in order to find our way back to a genuine and meaningful life.

Drawing (...) City (...) Body, Dwelling on Earth Pedro António Janeiro.2019-01-08 This international seminar's fifth edition, dedicated to the theme *Desenho (...) Cidade (...) "Who Am I?" Historical Narrative and Subjectivity in Anna Banti's *Camicia bruciata* Lucy Delogu.2013-01-04 This book investigates Anna Banti's contribution to the creation of a female literary canon, as well as the renewal of Italian literature, from stylistic and thematic points of view. The book examines Banti's contribution from a two-pronged perspective: as a promoter of female individuality and independence, in contrast to the existent paternal order; and as an innovator of the Italian novel, in particular, the Italian historical novel. This study mainly concentrates on the historical novel, *La camicia bruciata*, published in 1973. The analysis of the *Camicia bruciata* examines the structure of the historical novel - Anna Banti's representations of her male and female characters and their capacity for relationships - and the difference between the fictional story created by Anna Banti, and the historical facts narrated in *The House of Medici* by Sir Christopher Hibbert and *The Last Medici* by Harold Acton. The purpose of this analysis is to show how Banti's personal experience, mainly her idea of married life and motherhood, influenced her narrative and her characters.

Modern Retellings of Chivalric Texts Gloria Allaire.2018-12-24 Published in 1999, the ten essays in this collection identify and examine reworkings of identifiable source texts from the medieval or Renaissance periods. 'Romantic' and Its Cognates Hans Eichner.1972-12-15 Ever since the word romantic and its many cognates in European languages began to be used as technical terms towards the end of the eighteenth century, the quest for a satisfactory definition of their meanings has continued unabated. This collection of essays traces the history of the word in the major European languages, showing how romantic and its cognates were first introduced, how their usage spread and their connotations proliferated, and how their present usage became established. Mitchell of the Department of Germanic Languages and Literature, University of Illinois; and in Russia, by Professor Sigrid McLaughlin of the Department of Slavic Studies, University of California at Santa Cruz. The final essay, by H.H.H. Remak, Professor of German and Comparative Literature at the University of Indiana, reports on trends of recent research on West European romanticism and suggests fruitful avenues for further exploration. Suicide in Modern Literature Josefa Ros Velasco.2022-01-01 This book analyzes the social and contextual causes of suicide, the existential and philosophical reasons for committing suicide, and the prevention strategies that modern fictional literature places at our disposal. A century later, we still keep on trying to reach such an understanding of suicide, the nature, and nuances of its modern conceptualization, to prevent suicidal behaviors. The question of what suicide means in and for modernity is not an overcome one. Suicide is an act that touches all of our lives and engages with the incomprehensible and unsayable. Since the turn of the millennium, a fierce debate about the state's role in assisted suicide has been adopted. Beyond the discussion as to whether physicians should assist in the suicide of patients with unbearable and hopeless suffering, the scope of the suicidal agency is much broader concerning general people wanting to die.

Comedy and the Public Sphere Árpád Szakolczai.2013 The book aims at reframing the discussion on the public sphere, usually understood as the place where the public opinion is formed, through rational discussion.
