

# Compostelle Et Cultes De Saint Jacques Au Moyen A

**Mille fois à Compostelle** Adeline Rucquoi.2014 English summary: Medieval texts illustrate the popularity of the pilgrimage, the draw of holy places on the Christian masses. After Jerusalem and Rome, Santiago de Compostela emerged as an essential destination for medieval pilgrims seeking absolution and peace for their travel and penitence. The wealth of work done on Compostela in recent years allows us to trace the daily experiences of the men and women who followed the path to the end of Europe. French description: Le pelerinage a Compostelle, un moment-cle de la vie quotidienne au Moyen Age Le diable est alle mille fois a Compostelle assuraient a leurs ouailles les predicateurs parisiens du XIIIe siecle, inquiets de constater la multiplication des departs de leurs paroissiens, et desireux de les detourner de leur intention en leur montrant qu'ils pouvaient faire leur salut en restant chez eux. Mais ces mises en garde eurent peu d'effet. Depuis l'annonce, au milieu du IXe siecle, de la decouverte du tombeau de l'apotre Jacques le Majeur au bout de la terre, dans le finis terrae de l'ancienne Gallaecia romaine, les pelerins prenaient la route qui les menaient a Compostelle. Les textes ecrits et diffuses depuis le siege apostolique d'Espagne au XIIe siecle contribuerent a eriger le sanctuaire au niveau de ceux de Jerusalem et de Rome. Les trois pelerinages majeurs de la Chretiente occidentale permettaient ainsi aux pelerins de retourner aux sources du christianisme en Terre Sainte, Jerusalem etant identifiee a saint Jean l'Evangeliste et a la charite, de visiter le siege de l'Eglise militante a Rome, identifiee a saint Pierre donc a la foi, et d'aller vers le futur a Compostelle, saint Jacques personnifiant l'esperance. Les auteurs

des documents medievaux ne se souciaient pas de denommer de facon exacte et mathematique leurs contemporains; ils preferaient mentionner les foules nombreuses ou les milliers de combattants, et transmettre ainsi l'impression, la sensation, plus que la realite chiffree. Mais meme en tenant compte de l'hyperbole qui accompagne souvent les descriptions, il est indeniable que des milliers et des milliers d'hommes et de femmes prirent au Moyen Age la route vers l'un des trois sanctuaires ou les trois, une fois ou plusieurs fois dans leur vie, et que ce voyage devint parfois une coutume familiale. Il faut donc voir dans le pelerinage l'une des realites quotidiennes de ceux qui vecurent en Occident au Moyen Age. Les trois pelerinages ne sont cependant pas semblables. Le voyage en Terre Sainte demandait un lourd investissement en temps et en argent, ainsi qu'une prise en charge, a Venise d'abord, puis sur place, par les franciscains a partir du XIIIe siecle, dans la mesure ou les lieux saints etaient en territoire musulman et soigneusement controles; de plus, le voyage en Terre Sainte n'avait pas toujours ete pacifique, et l'espoir de recuperer ces lieux pour l'Eglise chretienne grace a une croisade resta fermement ancre dans l'esprit des Occidentaux jusqu'aux debuts de l'epoque Moderne. Le voyage a Rome etait un pelerinage aux lieux du martyre de nombreux saints, notamment des saints Pierre et Paul, et de tous ceux dont les reliques etaient vendues sur place a bon prix, mais Rome etait aussi le siege de la papaute et bien des sejours avaient pour but l'obtention d'une faveur, d'un privilege, d'une nomination ou d'une confirmation pontificales. Rien de tout cela n'existait a Compostelle ou le pelerin se rendait a son gre, au moment et suivant le chemin qu'il desirait, et n'etait attendu au terme de son voyage que par saint Jacques, l'apotre de l'esperance. Depuis quelques decennies les etudes se sont multipliees sur le pelerinage a Compostelle, faisant suite a celles qui avaient occupe pendant des decennies les specialistes de la Terre Sainte. Il est ainsi possible de tracer les experiences

quotidiennes de ceux qui, riches ou pauvres, femmes ou hommes, membres du clerge ou condamnés par la justice, prirent un jour la route vers le finistère de l'Europe ou reposait saint Jacques.

Compostelle et cultes de saint Jacques au Moyen Age Denise Péricard-Méa. 2000 Comment évoquer saint Jacques sans lier ce nom à celui de Compostelle ? C'est justement au retour d'un pèlerinage, en 1982, que Denise Péricard-Méa entreprit une thèse d'histoire sur le culte de saint Jacques et ses pèlerins en France au Moyen Age. Les résultats de cette recherche historique bousculent les idées généralement admises sur le culte de Jacques le Majeur reposant en Galice. Compostelle a bien sûr sa

place dans la légende construite au XIIe siècle à partir d'un rêve de Charlemagne, de même que dans les relations politiques, en particulier avec la Bourgogne, et dans l'imaginaire de la Chevalerie. Nul doute que cet imaginaire n'ait imprégné aussi l'esprit des pèlerins rendant un culte à un saint Jacques à la fois un et multiple dans l'un des nombreux sanctuaires locaux qui lui étaient dédiés. Car saint Jacques est incontestablement vénéré dans la France médiévale. Mais les pèlerins allant jusqu'en Galice n'étaient pas les plus nombreux. Denise Péricard-Méa s'est attachée à les identifier et à nous les faire mieux connaître, sans trouver traces des foules immenses dont on parle à satiété. With a reputation for aggression and conquest, they rapidly expanded their powerbase from Normandy, and by the end of the twelfth century had established themselves in positions of strength from England to Sicily, Antioch to Dublin. Yet, despite this success recent scholarship has begun to question the 'Norman Achievement' and look again at the degree to which a single Norman cultural identity existed across so diverse a territory. Taken as a whole the volume provides a fascinating assessment of the construction and malleability of Norman identities in transcultural settings. By

**A Soldiers' Chronicle of the Hundred Years War** Anne

Curry,Rémy Ambühl.2022 A remarkable and very important unpublished chronicle written by two soldiers, covering in detail the English campaigns in France from 1415 to 1429. It lists many individuals who served in the war, and was written specifically for Sir John Fastolf, the English commander.This previously unpublished chronicle from the mid-fifteenth century covers the English wars in France from 1415 to 1429. It is highly unusual in that it was written by two soldiers, Peter Basset and Christopher Hanson. William Worcester, secretary to the English commander Sir John Fastolf, also had a hand in it, and it was specifically written for Sir John. The content is unusual, as it includes many lists of individuals serving in the war, and records their presence at battles, naming more than 700 in all. Over half these individuals are French or Scottish, so it would seem that the authors had a particularly detailed knowledge of French military participation. The narrative is important for the English campaigns in Maine in the 1420s in which Fastolf was heavily involved and which otherwise receive little attention in chronicles written on either side of the Channel. The progress of the war is well mapped, with around 230 place names mentioned.The chronicle was extensively used in the sixteenth century by several heralds and by Edward Hall. As a result, it had an influence on Shakespeare. The death of the earl of Salisbury at Orleans in "Henry VI Part I" Follows the chronicle closely. The "Mirror for Magistrates" Salisbury narrative is also derived from the chronicle. Michel O'Neill.2017-02-01T00:00:00-05:00 Depuis le milieu des années 1990, plusieurs dizaines de milliers de Québécoises et de Québécois sont allés marcher sur les chemins qui mènent à Saint-Jacques-de-Compostelle, ce haut lieu de pèlerinage chrétien depuis le Moyen-Age situé au nord-ouest de l'Espagne. Les motivations de ces personnes sont diverses et loin d'être exclusivement religieuses. De retour dans leur pays, certains de ces pèlerins ont démarré des chemins au Québec, afin d'offrir la possibilité de vivre l'expérience de la marche pèlerine de longue durée sans avoir à se déplacer en Europe.
